#### **The YMTF Program**

#### A Retrospective

The Youth Motivation Task Force concept originated in a program called Plans for Progress, which was developed in 1961 to work with President Kennedy's Committee on Equal Employment Opportunity. It was a voluntary effort by the leaders of American business and industry to aggressively promote and implement equal employment opportunity.

A two-year national communications campaign, coordinated by the Advertising Council, using radio and television, was initiated. The objective of this campaign was to inform minority youth concerning career opportunities in business and industry. In addition, members of minority groups, who were also executives of Plans for Progress companies, conducted a nationwide program of visits to colleges, senior high schools, and junior high schools with large minority enrollments. The objective of this program was to motivate more young people toward business and industry careers.

In 1965, it was determined that a more concentrated effort was necessary. Vice President Hubert Humphrey asked 85 prominent black businessmen to personally visit predominantly black colleges. Out of this desire for a more consistent and concentrated effort, the concept of YMTF began.

#### YMTF Mission and Objective

Knowing where you want to go is far simpler than knowing how to get there. College students are often faced with this dilemma. With so many choices before them, they often need career directions. The students want to be assured that there are meaningful jobs in the workplace and they seek the security of knowing that they will be properly prepared.

The Youth Motivation Task Force (YMTF) program has helped more than five million students become aware of the variety of careers available to them in the private and public sector. The program concept is quite simple, but effective. Informed, dedicated and successful professionals from every walk of life meet with students at predominantly minority colleges and universities. Their aim is to explain career opportunities in business and industry, discuss how the work world operates, and share their personal career experiences. These professionals provide students with the direction and insight that is needed to make realistic career decisions.

Dr. Mark S. Berry, P.E., is currently vice president of research and development for Southern Company Services. Named to the position in August 2019, Berry is responsible for developing low- and no-carbon generation technologies, advancing distributed energy solutions, modernizing the grid, promoting a culture of sustainability and developing new business models.

Berry also serves as vice president of environmental and natural resources for Georgia Power. Named to the position in August 2015, Berry is responsible for maximizing the value from Georgia Power-owned natural resources, acquiring real estate to support company operations and managing the company's environmental compliance and stewardship programs to meet or surpass all environmental laws and regulations.

Berry returned to Southern Company after most recently serving as director in the generation sector at the Electric Power Research Institute (EPRI), where he managed research and development efforts in renewables, water management, carbon capture and storage, and advanced fossil generation. Prior to EPRI, he served as director of energy and environment at Southern Research.

Berry worked 17 years in various capacities of increasing responsibility at Southern Company. He served as manager of environmental assessment for Southern Company's research and environmental affairs organization, where he managed the company's regulatory response to federal rule-making activity and the environmental science research program. He also served as director of research and technology management, managing a portfolio of research related to emission controls, energy efficiency, renewables, power delivery, central station generation and carbon capture, utilization and storage.

Prior to joining Southern Company, Berry attained the commissioned rank of lieutenant commander in the United States Navy as a surface warfare officer. While on active duty, he served upon the USS Gunston Hall (LSD-44) in the capacities of deck officer and combat information center officer. After joining the reserves, he served as an engineering officer supporting the USS Sentry (MCM-3) and as an intelligence officer supporting the Defense Intelligence Agency (DIA HQ).

Berry holds a bachelor's degree in mathematics from Alabama A&M University, and a bachelor's and master's degree in mechanical engineering and Ph.D. in interdisciplinary engineering from the University of Alabama at Birmingham. He also earned a master's degree in public and private management from Birmingham-Southern College and is a registered professional engineer. He is a graduate of Leadership Atlanta.

Berry is vice chair of the Research Advisory Council at EPRI. He is an advisory board member of the Strategic Energy Institute at the Georgia Institute of Technology and the School of Engineering at the University of Alabama at Birmingham. Berry is a governing board member of the Metropolitan North Georgia Water Planning District and serves on the boards of the Georgia Conservancy, Georgia Wildlife Federation, Institute for Georgia Environmental Leadership and Fernbank Museum of Natural History. He serves on the advisory boards of the Georgia Chapter of Trust for Public Land, Atlanta Audubon Society and is a former board member of the Youth Motivation Task Force at Alabama A&M University. Berry is a member of 100 Black Men of Atlanta where he serves on the program committee. Additionally, he serves as executive champion of the Georgia Power AMIGOS employee resource group, which assists in the recruiting, retention and development of Hispanic/Latino employees.

Berry is an active, lifetime member of Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity Inc. He has established two scholarships for minority students pursuing a degree in engineering in the name of his grandfathers — an endowed scholarship in the name of Marion Luscious Nell at the University of Alabama at Birmingham, and the Simpson Berry Sr. Endowed Scholarship at Alabama A&M University.

Born and raised in Birmingham, Alabama, Berry and his wife, Crystal, have four children.

## Benjamin T. Davis Legacy Award

At the 40th anniversary celebration of the Youth Motivation Task Force Outreach Program (YMTF) in March 2016, Mr. Benjamin T. Davis, Jr. was honored for establishing the YMTF program at Alabama Agricultural and Mechanical University (AAMU). In recognition of his faithful service and leadership for more than 40 years, the Benjamin T. Davis, Jr. Legacy Award was announced.

Mr. Davis established the Placement Office at AAMU in 1966 and served faithfully until 1974. He forged relationships with employers in the public and private sectors that helped AAMU become a go-to institution of higher learning for students of color.

Mr. Davis transferred his exceptional leadership skills to the public and private sectors. He retired from the CIA in 2013 and returned to work at his beloved alma mater.

An AAMU employee whose service to the YMTF program that reflects the commitment, endurance, and compassion displayed by Mr. Benjamin T. Davis Jr. will be recognized with this award.

#### Alabama A&M University History

Alabama Agricultural and Mechanical University is a land-grant University. It receives support from the State of Alabama and through federal funds appropriated to assist in carrying on work stipulated by the Morrill Acts of 1862 and 1890. The University is under the control of a board of trustees appointed by the Governor, who serves as ex officio Chairman. The University was organized in 1875 as the result of a bill passed in the State Legislature in 1873 and through the continued efforts of its first principal and president, William Hooper Council, an ex-slave.

The school opened on May 1, 1875, as the Huntsville Normal School with an appropriation of \$1,000 per year, 61 students, and two teachers. Industrial education was introduced around 1878. It attracted wide attention, and the school was assisted financially by the Slater and Peabody Funds, along with private contributors. The work in industrial education was so successful that the State Legislature authorized the name to be changed to the "State Normal and Industrial School at Huntsville." The appropriation was increased by the State to \$4,000 per year. In 1891, the school became the recipient of a part of the Federal Land-Grant Fund provided by an act of Congress, approved August 30, 1890. The purpose of this fund was to further training in agriculture and mechanical arts in the various states at the college level.

The name of the school was changed again to "The State Agricultural and Mechanical College for Negroes," and a new location was provided at Normal, Alabama, where the school would have ample room for the development of its trades and agricultural programs. In 1919, the institution became a junior college, and its name was changed to "The State Agricultural and Mechanical Institute for Negroes." In 1939, by authority of the State Board of Education, the Institute was permitted to offer work on the senior college level. The first graduation class since 1920 received the bachelor's degree in 1941, and on January 14, 1948, the name was again changed to "Alabama Agricultural and Mechanical College." On June 26, 1969, the Alabama State Board of Education, the governing body of the institution, adopted a resolution changing the name of the

institution to "Alabama Agricultural and Mechanical University." The University received a "Class A" rating by the Southern Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools in August 1946 and became a fully accredited member of the Association in December 1963.


