We are excited to share with you our second quarterly newsletter which highlights the efforts of OMA through programming, engagements, and initiatives. The Office of Multicultural Affairs was established to promote access and equity across the University, to welcome and celebrate the experiences of all students regardless of background, through intentional programming, and to improve campus climate that builds a more welcoming and inclusive community.

The OMA staff continues to work diligently towards creating a campus culture of inclusivity and belonging for our diverse student population through programs, engagements, and initiatives. To

include our students in our efforts, we accompanied student representatives to the Organized Radical Collegiate Activism (ORCA) Conference held in February at the University of Alabama Birmingham where students learned how activists are tackling social justice across Alabama, and how they can do the same for passionate issues.

I am most proud of the launch of our United Against Hate (UAH) Initiative in partnership with the U.S. Attorney's Office for the N orthern D istrict of A labama, and our D epartment of P ublic Safety. Over 200 students joined us for a two-day symposium on March 5th and 6th. The symposium featured a panel discussion with representatives from the Federal Bureau of Investigation, U.S. Attorney's Office, District Attorney's Office, and Department of Justice. The discussion covered important topics such as how to identify, report, and prevent hate crimes, as well as how to build trust between law enforcement and communities. Students also participated in group exercises that challenged their thoughts and actions on reporting hate crimes. We were honored to receive notification that the news of our symposium reached Washington D.C. Kudos were received via email directly from Assistant Attorney General Kristen Clarke acknowledging the coordination of such an amazing program. AAMU is the first HBCU in the state to host such an event. We appreciate the continued support of the AAMU campus community as we strive to infuse diversity into the AAMU campus culture and establish a reputation of inclusive excellence. No unit or department can achieve this alone; fostering inclusion, belonging, and participation requires consistent and intentional efforts from all of us.

**United Against Hate Symposium:** The **United Against Hate Symposium** was a twoday symposium that fostered a discussion on how to identify hate crimes and how to combat hate in our communities. On Day 1, students were presented information on the seven protected classes. Additionally, there was a panel discussion with partners from the U.S. Attorney's Office for the Northern District of Alabama, Federal Bureau of Investigation, and Alabama A&M University Campus Police Department. Day 2 provided an opportunity for students to delve deeper into the seven protected classes. During the workshop, students were encouraged to ask questions and provide their perspectives on how we can work together to unite our community to combat and prevent

violence. The symposium engaged over 200 students.

**Lunar New Year Celebration:** The Office of Multicultural Affair and the Global Initiative Program collaborated to present the **Lunar (Chinese) New Year Celebration** on February 12th. Lunar New Year is the most important holiday in China and places with large Chinese populations. Every Lunar New Year corresponds with an animal from the Chinese zodiac, which



consists of a dozen animals based on a 12year cycle. Lunar New Year 2024 is the **Year of the Dragon**, the fifth sign in the Chinese zodiac calendar. Dragon people are said to be confident, independent, charismatic, ambitious, adventurous and fearless. Students created Chinese art, enjoyed a cultural display, and food samples.



#### International Women's Day Celebration

**International Women's Day** was celebrated on March 8th as attendees represented in their shades of purple. The event was modeled after a cocktail hour and celebrated the achievements of women and reinforced a commitment to women equality. Dr. Sadguna Anasuri, Associate Professor

of Human Development and Family Studies, offered words of expression on the importance of celebrating and supporting women under the national theme "Inspire Inclusion." A





highlight of the celebration included a toast to all women. Our sincere appreciation to the Office of Alumni Affairs for partnering with us on this celebration.




#### **Bulldog Parent University**
