# Past Perfect Tense

Past perfect tense refers to an action completed at a time in the past BEFORE another past *time* or *action*. It is used to show a <u>chronological relationship</u> between two or more actions/ situations/events in the past.

⇒ I had decided to switch majors before I entered my sophomore year of college. [past <u>action</u>]

### The Past Perfect Tense is not the same as the <u>Simple Past Tense</u>. Simple Past Tense refers to ONE action that began and ended in the past:

⇒ I decided to switch majors last semester. [one action began and ended in the past]

	Singular	Plural
First Person	I had decided	We have decided
Second Person	You had decided	You have decided
Third Person	He, she, it has decided	They have decided

# Present Perfect Tense

#### Present perfect tense indicates a relationship between the present and the past. It refers to a situation that began in the past and still continues into the present

- $\Rightarrow$  They have lived in Alabama for thirteen years. [situation originating in the past still continues]
- $\Rightarrow$  I have cooked that recipe already. Do you have another? [past action that is currently relevant]

## The present perfect of any verb is the auxiliary verb *to have* (present tense), plus a past tense verb.

	Affirmative	
Subject	to have	past participle
She	has	visited.
	Negative	
Subject	to have + not	past participle
She	has not (hasn't)	visited.
	Interrogative	
to have	subject	past participle
Has	she	visited?
