STATEMENT OF TEACHING PHILOSOPHY

I. Overview

A professor's challenge is to guide students to the concepts involved in the course being taught as well as to guide them to be able to apply the concepts to varying situations and circumstances. My philosophy is to not focus on the memorization or recitation of formulas, or abstract pieces of information. Rather, my focus is to assist students with learning fundamental concepts of a particular subject, such that they can then take any formulas or other similar information and use the concepts to solve the problem and/or questions presented. This way the students actually learn the substantive information, rather than get weighted down by the peripheral information in the course. Thus students are more easily able to comprehend larger amounts of subject matter as they realize that the subject can be broken down into smaller concepts and how these concepts fit into the overall spectrum of the course.

II. Class Participation/Preparation

I believe in class participation and involvement of students within the lecture. This assists the professor in ensuring that the students actually understand the material as well as to highlight areas of challenges for the students in the course. I think that preparation for class is also important, as the professor can cover more material when the students are prepared to discuss the concepts involved in the course. As such, I believe in providing some credit for class participation and preparation in the overall course grade.

III. Examinations

I believe examinations should test what is actually taught in the course, and should focus on the substantive concepts that each student should have learned in the course. To that end, I believe in providing students every opportunity to prepare and learn the information prior to the exam being taken. I believe in allowing review sessions for the students prior to the exam to allow for questions concerning the material covered on the exam to ensure appropriate understanding for students.

IV. Continuous Learning

I do not believe that a professor's teaching methodology should be rigid, but instead should be evolving and open to adjustment. For example, a professor should be willing to examine their teaching methodology and/or philosophy to determine its effectiveness toward reaching students. There may be components of a professor's teaching philosophy or methodology that need to be removed as well as some new components that may be more advantageous to the students' learning in the course. I am willing to be flexible and to review and revise my teaching philosophy and/or methodology as necessary to ensure I am able to fully connect, encourage, instruction, and enlighten students in the courses that I teach.
