

University History

The Alabama Agricultural and Mechanical University is a land-grant University. Its support comes from the State of Alabama and federal funds appropriated to assist in carrying on work stipulated by the Morrill Acts 1862 and 1890. The University is under the control of a board of trustees appointed by the Governor, who serves as ex officio Chairman.

The University was organized in 1875 as the result of a bill passed in the State Legislature in 1873 and through the continued efforts of its first principal and president, William Hooper Councill, an ex-slave. The school opened on May 1, 1875, as the Huntsville Normal School with an appropriation of \$1,000 per year, 61 students, and two teachers.

Industrial education was introduced around 1878. It attracted wide attention, and the school was assisted financially by the Slater and Peabody Funds and by private contributors. The work in industrial education was so successful that the State Legislature authorized the name to be changed to the "State Normal and Industrial School at Huntsville." The appropriation was increased by the State to \$4,000 per year.

In 1891, the school became the recipient of a part of the Federal Land-Grant Fund provided by an act of Congress, approved August 30, 1890. The purpose of this fund was to further training in agricultural and mechanical arts in the various states at the college level.

The name of the school was changed again to "The State Agricultural and Mechanical College for Negroes," and a new location was provided at Normal, Alabama, where the school would have ample room for the development of its trades and agricultural programs. In 1919, the institution became a junior college, and its name was changed to "The State Agricultural and Mechanical Institute for Negroes."

In 1939, by authority of the State Board of Education, the Institute was permitted to offer work on the senior college level. The first graduation class since 1920 received the bachelor's degree in 1941, and on January 14, 1948, the name was again changed to "Alabama Agricultural and Mechanical College." On June 26, 1969, the Alabama State Board of Education, the governing body of the institution, adopted a resolution changing the name of the institution to "Alabama Agricultural and Mechanical University."

The University received a "Class A" rating by the Southern Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools in August 1946 and became a fully accredited member of the Association in December 1963.

Alabama A&M University is a dynamic and progressive institution with a strong commitment to academic excellence. The picturesque campus is situated on what many alumni and friends fondly refer to as "The Hill", only a few miles from downtown Huntsville. Serving about 6,000 students, the institution is a diverse and vibrant microcosm of the larger world around it, attracting visits of 19 Nobel Laureates. Alabama A&M University offers numerous degree programs, including the Ph.D. degrees in Applied Physics, Food Science, Plant, and Soil Science, and Reading/Literacy.

The Ceremonial Heademic Mace



The ceremonial academic mace emerged in the fourteenth century Europe from a combination of the royal scepter and the medieval battle mace. The scepter was the traditional symbol of royalty used during the coronation of kings and emperors, while the battle mace was a weapon of protection used by princes. By the late Middle Ages, the mace had become a symbol of the lawful authority of royalty, chief officers of medieval universities, mayors of towns and cities, and bishops.

Today, the ceremonial mace is used during commencement exercises to symbolize authority vested in the University President to act on behalf of the Board of Trustees, faculty and staff to confer academic degrees. It is carried in the academic procession by the head marshal, who immediately precedes the President to maintain the dignity and solemnity of the occasion.

The 2019 Mace was commissioned by Dr. Andrew Hugine, Jr., the eleventh president of the university in commemoration of the fiftieth anniversary of the designation of the institution as a university. The mace encompasses the significant events in the history of the university. Atop the mace is a sphere containing the official seal of the university on one side and the great seal of the State of Alabama denoting the university's designation as a state institution on the other. The base of the sphere is a hexagon, each side containing one of the official names of the university since its founding. A brass circular band contains the motto of the university, "service is sovereignty." On individual rings on the shaft of the mace are inscribed the names of the presidents of the university and their dates of service.

The Beademic Costume

The caps, gowns and hoods routinely worn during functions at institutions of higher learning date back to the Medieval period. Monks and students used the garments to remain warm in halls of learning as well as in the often-cold castles of the Middle Ages. From these practical beginnings, these items have emerged into the accepted garb to symbolize scholarly achievement.

Baccalaureate gowns have a long-pleated front with shirring across the shoulders and back. They are primarily distinguished by flowing sleeves and are pointed at the fingertips. These gowns may be worn either open or closed.

The master's degree gown is worn open or closed, and the sleeve is cut so that the forearm comes through a slit just above the elbow.

Gowns for the doctorate degree are worn open. They carry broad, velvet panels down the front, and three velvet bars on the full, round sleeves. The velvet trimming may be either black or the color of distinctive of the degree.

Mortar boards- or caps worn with baccalaureate and master's gowns- generally have black tassels. The tassel of the doctoral cap is usually made of gold bullion.

The gold fourragère on the shoulders of some candidates-commonly referred to as an honor cord-denotes outstanding scholastic distinction.

Faculty members and guests in today's procession are robed in gowns and hoods which represent the institutions from which they have received degrees.

The hood gives color and real meaning to the academic regalia. Its silk lining bears the colors of the institution conferring the degree. The hood is bordered with velvet of prescribed width and color to indicate the field of learning to which the degree pertains as follows:
