The YMTF Program

A Retrospective

The Youth Motivation Task Force concept originated in a program called Plans for Progress, which was developed in 1961 to work with President Kennedy's Committee on Equal Employment Opportunity. It was a voluntary effort by the leaders of American business and industry to aggressively promote and implement equal employment opportunity.

A two-year national communications campaign, coordinated by the Advertising Council, using radio and television, was initiated. The objective of this campaign was to inform minority youth concerning career opportunities in business and industry. In addition, members of minority groups, who were also executives of Plans for Progress companies, conducted a nationwide program of visits to colleges, senior high schools, and junior high schools with large minority enrollments. The objective of this program was to motivate more young people toward business and industry careers.

In 1965, it was determined that a more concentrated effort was necessary. Vice President Hubert Humphrey asked 85 prominent black businessmen to personally visit predominantly black colleges. Out of this desire for a more consistent and concentrated effort, the concept of YMTF began.

YMTF Mission and Objective

Knowing where you want to go is far simpler than knowing how to get there. College students are often faced with this dilemma. With so many choices before them, they often need career directions. The students want to be assured that there are meaningful jobs in the workplace and they seek the security of knowing that they will be properly prepared.

The Youth Motivation Task Force (YMTF) program has helped more than five million students become aware of the variety of careers available to them in the private and public sector. The program concept is quite simple, but effective. Informed, dedicated and successful professionals from every walk of life meet with students at predominantly minority colleges and universities. Their aim is to explain career opportunities in business and industry, discuss how the work world operates, and share their personal career experiences. These professionals provide students with the direction and insight that is needed to make realistic career decisions.



Hayes F. Fountain III

Chief Executive Officer and President Widescope Consulting and Contracting Services, LLC.

Keynote Speaker Bio



Hayes Fountain serves as the President and CEO of Widescope Consulting and Contracting Services, LLC. A distinguished veteran of the First Gulf War, he holds the distinction of being the first graduate from a Historically Black College or University (HBCU) to serve as a nuclear-qualified engineer officer in the U.S. Navy.

Embarking on his higher education journey at Delaware State College in 1980, Hayes received the E.I. DuPont Mobile Oil engineering curriculum scholarship. The strong foundation in Physics and Calculus acquired from mentors Mr. Washington and Mr. Hamilton laid the groundwork for his academic success. Hayes later earned a Bachelor of Applied Science (B.A.Sc.) in Computational and Applied Mathematics from Hampton University and a Master's Degree in Business Management from Troy University.

During his impressive 16-year tenure in active duty, Hayes served on three submarines, various shore commands, and multiple overseas assignments. He proudly completed the UCLA Executive Leadership Program for media executives at the UCLA Anderson School of Management.

Transitioning from military service, Hayes joined Viacom/BET as Director of IT Projects and rose to Vice President of Broadcast Operations. He oversaw post-production work, IT projects, and digital asset management for BET Networks. Subsequently, Hayes worked at Turner Broadcasting, first as Vice President of Network Operations and later as Vice President of Strategic Technology Outreach for all Turner properties.

In 2012, Hayes became Senior Vice President of Technology and Chief Information Officer at ION Media Networks. His leadership facilitated the migration of IT services to Clearwater, Florida, and the establishment of a cutting-edge data center.

In 2014, Hayes co-founded Widescope Consulting and Contracting Services, LLC, a company excelling in management and technology consulting. Under Hayes' leadership, Widescope has achieved significant growth, providing a range of services, including cyber security, IT support, submarine fiber optics cabling, facility management, security modernization, video teleconferencing installations, and information assurance.

Recognized for his accomplishments, Hayes received the Veteran-Owned Small Business Person of the Year Award for South Florida from the Florida Small Business Development Center Network. He was also honored by the Pinellas County Board of County Commissioners with the Thank You for Doing Business in Pinellas Award.

Beyond his professional achievements, Hayes is dedicated to mentoring young professionals through the Eagles Organization, contributing to discussion forums, and giving back to the community through his involvement with Kappa Alpha Psi fraternity and Destiny World Church in Austell, Georgia.





Alabama A&M University History

Alabama Agricultural and Mechanical University is a land-grant University. It receives support from the State of Alabama and through federal funds appropriated to assist in carrying on work stipulated by the Morrill Acts of 1862 and 1890. The University is under the control of a board of trustees appointed by the Governor, who serves as ex officio Chairman. The University was organized in 1875 as the result of a bill passed in the State Legislature in 1873 and through the continued efforts of its first principal and president, William Hooper Councill, an ex-slave.

The school opened on May 1, 1875, as the Huntsville Normal School with an appropriation of \$1,000 per year, 61 students, and two teachers. Industrial education was introduced around 1878. It attracted wide attention, and the school was assisted financially by the Slater and Peabody Funds, along with private contributors. The work in industrial education was so successful that the State Legislature authorized the name to be changed to the "State Normal and Industrial School at Huntsville." The appropriation was increased by the State to \$4,000 per year. In 1891, the school became the recipient of a part of the Federal Land-Grant Fund provided by an act of Congress, approved August 30, 1890. The purpose of this fund was to further training in agriculture and mechanical arts in the various states at the college level.

The name of the school was changed again to "The State Agricultural and Mechanical College for Negroes," and a new location was provided at Normal, Alabama, where the school would have ample room for the development of its trades and agricultural programs. In 1919, the institution became a junior college, and its name was changed to "The State Agricultural and Mechanical Institute for Negroes." In 1939, by authority of the State Board of Education, the Institute was permitted to offer work on the senior college level. The first graduation class since 1920 received the bachelor's degree in 1941, and on January 14, 1948, the name was again changed to "Alabama Agricultural and Mechanical College." On June 26, 1969, the Alabama State Board of Education, the governing body of the institution, adopted a resolution changing the name of the institution to "Alabama Agricultural and Mechanical University." The University received a "Class A" rating by the Southern Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools in August 1946 and became a fully accredited member of the Association in December 1963.

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
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
